## **Management Discussion of Performance**

### **Investment Objective and Strategies**

The Portfolio aims to provide reasonable current income and growth of your investment over the long term by investing in a mix of income oriented mutual funds and equity mutual funds. The Portfolio invests in a variety of other mutual funds managed by different portfolio managers.

#### Risk

The risks associated with investing in the Portfolio remain as discussed in the prospectus. This Portfolio is suitable for investors with a below average tolerance for risk. It is best suited to those seeking exposure to both fixed-income and equity securities. Any changes in the Portfolio have not affected the overall level of risk of the Portfolio.

### **Results of Operations**

The NEI Select Balanced Portfolio's Series A units returned -2.41% for the six months ended March 31, 2016 compared with a return of -0.92% for the benchmark explained below.

Unlike the benchmark return, the Portfolio's returns are after the deduction of fees and expenses paid by the Portfolio. Performance differences between series of units are mainly attributable to management fees charged to each series. Refer to the Past Performance section for the details of returns by series.

The blended benchmark is composed of a 50% weight in the FTSE TMX Canada Universe Bond Index, a 15% weight in the S&P/TSX Total Return Index, and a 35% weight in the MSCI World Index (C\$).

### **Factors That Have Affected Performance**

After a tough third quarter, the fourth quarter of 2015 began on a positive note as fears surrounding global growth and systemic risks subsided. Market participants were back to risk-on as global equity markets rallied over 8% after hitting two-year lows while credit spreads tightened over 100bps. However, this rally was short lived as oil prices resumed its drop in November while Chinese economic data continued to disappoint. Crude oil as measured by WTI finished the quarter almost 20% lower amidst reports of continued oversupply, and further exacerbated by OPEC's decision in early December to actually increase production. In China, despite accommodative actions by the central bank, manufacturing and export data continued to fall below expectations, dragging down the broader equity market as well as further contributing to the drop in crude oil.

Diverging monetary policies was a major theme in the fourth quarter of 2015 as the U.S. Federal Reserve finally raised interest rates by 25bps, the first increase in almost 10 years. Meanwhile, the European Central Bank continued its accommodative monetary policy as they cut the deposit facility rate from -0.2% to -0.3% while extending Quantitative Easing to at least March 2017. The People's Bank of China also enacted a series of stimulative measures, including a reduction of mortgage down payment requirements, a 25bps interest rate cut, a 50bps reserve ratio requirement cut, as well as abandoning their one-child policy.

The first quarter of 2016 kicked off with yet another widespread correction. The risk assets sell-off into mid-February saw global equities drop 11%, credit spreads widen 180bps, and WTI crude oil plunge another 23%. Market sentiment seemed to turn on February 11 as OPEC announced it was ready to cooperate on an oil production cut while dovish comments from U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) chair Janet Yellen pushed back expectations for further interest rate hikes this year.

During the first quarter of 2016 the Bank of Japan (BoJ) adopted negative interest rates in late January while the European Central Bank (ECB) expanded their Quantitative Easing programme as well as surprising the market with further interest rate cuts in March. Meanwhile, the U.S. Federal Reserve held off on further raising interest rates.

Over the period, the greatest contributors to overall returns were the NEI Northwest U.S. Dividend Fund (Series I), at approximately 9% weight, returning 9.17%, and the NEI Ethical Global Equity Fund (Series I), at approximately 10% weight, returning 5.88%.

### **Recent Developments**

The first quarter of 2016 took investors on a rollercoaster ride, starting downward on fear of Chinese slowdown, US Fed rate increases, collapsing oil prices and Canadian dollar. Next, from mid-February, a strong rally across most equity markets and commodities was ignited by the soothing words of the US Fed, more easing from the ECB and Bank of Japan, a stabilization of the Chinese economy and a rebound in oil price and the Canadian dollar. In our opinion this early selloff was overdone, the global leading indicators were still pointing to an expansion in developed markets, the monetary conditions were still benign, and the Chinese indicators appeared to stabilize, although at a lower level.

We expect Canadian fixed income markets to remain under pressure over the remainder of this year. The meagre but positive growth we expect for Canada may allow for a tightening of corporate spread premiums helping to keep the overall prospect for fixed income to be at best marginally positive for the remainder of the year.

The Canadian equity market is heavily reliant on commodities prices and the recent rebound in oil and metals price has helped improved the prospect for Canadian equity. While we do not expect the meteoric rise of oil prices to continue, given the slow global growth and the easy availability of additional supply, a level of \$40-\$50 bbl should allow for positive prospect for Canadian equities. In our view, Canadian equity valuations remain attractive given the bottoming process underway for the economy.



In the US, we expect the recently dovish US Fed, continued strong job creation and the recent swoon in the US dollar to keep the economy growing at a reasonable and developed world leading rate. This has already been priced in by the market and valuations have reached level that historically would suggest limited upward potential. While the economic prospects are relatively good, corporate earnings have disappointed and wages and price pressure are also likely to provide some headwinds. We still believe that the current economic context, above long term average spread and the relative benign defaults rates (outside of the energy space) are making this asset class attractive given the typically low correlation with US Treasury.

In international equity markets, we expect the ECB and the Bank of Japan will continue and even accelerate or extend their Quantitative Easing programs in an attempt to sustain barely growing economies. The referendum on a British exit ("Brexit") from the Eurozone is likely to continue to generate volatility in European equity and pose a political risk for our forecast. At this time, we evaluate that the attractive valuations of European equities are compensating for this uncertainty.

In Emerging Markets, we believe the key to success will be to be selective and favoring countries where consumer spending and infrastructure building carries the day rather than commodity driven economies. In our estimate, emerging market equities are one of the few area where valuations are relatively cheap and an improving global sentiment may actually create significant opportunities once global growth accelerate and if commodity prices continue a gradual recovery.

### **Financial Notes**

#### **HST**

Following the introduction of a single harmonized tax "HST" levy and collection system on July 1st, 2010 Investment Funds had to change the way in which government taxes are charged to the Funds. The new rules require HST to be calculated and charged based on a blended tax rate derived from the residency of the unitholders and the current value of their units. This blended rate is required to be calculated and updated periodically and the table below indicates the current rate being charged until the Fund's next year end as well as the most recent completed period's rate for comparison.

Effective April 1st, 2013, British Columbia replaced the 12% HST with separate PST and GST. A 5% GST rate is applicable going forward. Prince Edward Island introduced a new HST rate of 14%.

On January 1st, 2013, Quebec increased the combined tax rate charged on the QST portion of taxable services from 14.95% to 14.975%.

### Accounting Standards

The Fund's interim financial statements have been prepared in compliance with IFRS, as published by the International Accounting Standards Board, applicable to the preparation of interim financial statements, including International Accounting Standards ("IAS") 34, "Interim Financial Reporting" and IFRS 1, "First-time Adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards". The Fund has adopted this basis of accounting effective January 1, 2014 as required by Canadian securities legislation and the Canadian Accounting Standards Board.



### **Related Party Transactions**

Northwest and Ethical Investments L.P "NEILP" is the Manager, the Trustee, the Portfolio Manager and the Registrar of the Portfolio. NEILP is 50% indirectly owned by the Federation des Caisses Desjardins du Quebec (Federation) and 50% owned by five Provincial Credit Union Centrals.

NEILP charges the Portfolios a fixed administration fee in place of certain variable expenses. NEILP in turn, pays all operating expenses of the Portfolio, other than specified fund costs (e.g. the fees and expense of the Independent Review Committee, taxes, and brokerage commissions) which include payments to related parties of which the Federation is a significant owner. These services are in the normal course of operations and are measured at an exchange amount that is consistent with other independent parties.

At the end of the period, the accrued expenses payable to related third parties are listed below. Where applicable the amounts received from underlying funds during the period are also presented.

The Portfolio's sub advisors may place a portion of their portfolio transactions with brokerage firms which are affiliates of NEILP; provided that the affiliates trade execution abilities and costs are comparable to those of non-affiliated qualified brokerage firms.

The Portfolio is distributed through Credential Asset Management Inc., Credential Securities Inc., Desjardins Securities Inc., Desjardins Financial Securities Investments Inc., and Gestions SFL Inc., and other nonrelated parties by way of shared ownership. NEILP pays to these parties distribution and servicing fees based on a percentage of the daily values of the units of each held by the dealer's clients and additionally, in some cases, on the amount of initial purchase.

<sup>(3)</sup> The portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Portfolio's subadvisor manages its investment holdings. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Portfolio buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the Portfolio in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the period. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund. Certain turnover rates for September 2011 were restated due to a formula inconsistency.



## **Management Fees**

The Manager is responsible for the management, supervision and administration of the Portfolio. The Manager receives from the Portfolio management fees, before HST, calculated daily on the net asset value of the Portfolio at an annual rate shown below.

The management fee covers the cost of investment advisory fees, sales, marketing, and distribution expenses of the Portfolio. In addition, the Manager may pay a trailer fee to dealers out of this management fee. The trailer fee is a percentage of the average daily value of the units of the Portfolio held by the dealer's clients.

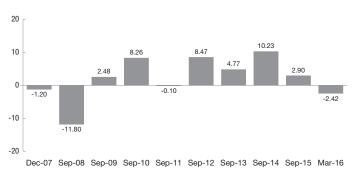
### **Past Performance**

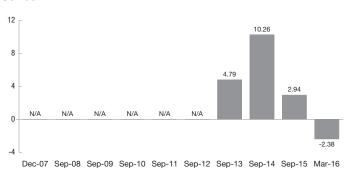
### Year-by-Year Returns

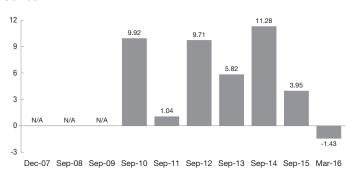

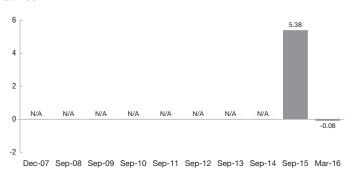

## **Annualized Compound Returns**

The following table shows the annual compound returns for all series of the Portfolio. All returns are in Canadian dollars, on a total return basis, net of all fees. For comparison, the returns for the benchmark are included.

The blended benchmark is composed of a 50% weight in the FTSE TMX Canada Universe Bond Index, a 15% weight in the S&P/TSX Total Return Index, and a 35% weight in the MSCI World Index (C\$).

The FTSE TMX Canada Universe Bond Index is designed to be a broad measure of the Canadian investment-grade fixed income market. Returns are calculated daily, and are weighted by market capitalization, so that the return on a bond influences the return on the index in proportion to the bond's market value.

The S&P/TSX Composite Total Return Index is a capitalization weighted index that measures market activity of stocks traded on the Toronto Stock Exchange. The Index includes reinvestment of dividends and capital gains.

The MSCI World Index is a free float-adjusted market capitalization index that is designed to measure developed market equity performance.

While the Portfolio uses this benchmark for long-term performance comparisons, it is not managed relative to the composition of the Index. As a result, the Portfolio may experience periods when its performance is not aligned with the Index, either positively or negatively. Please see the "Results of Operations" section of this report for a discussion of recent performance results.
